President's Report to Members by Ron Albany

Dear Members,

Clubhouse Improvements:

Work on paving the Assembly Area outside the Pro-Shop will commence on Monday 1st March 2010. Work will involve the removal of excess material, installation of drains and pits, re-grading the area with wet mix crushed rock and sealing with bituminous concrete. The work will take 7 days and is obviously subject to weather and a further couple of days for curing and settling.

Unfortunately, there will be a fair amount of disruption to all members, guests and green fee players but it cannot be avoided.

There are several marked up plans around the club house that show restricted areas, no access areas and entry and exits to the club house and pro-shop.

Due to safety reasons we ask that you obey these directions and ask that you be patient for this short period of time. The effort will be worthwhile. (Con't...)

I have been asked on several occasions as to why we have opted for bitumen vs. rubberised seal and the answer is simply that the cost of the rubberised seal is prohibitive, particularly given that we would have been up for the cost of drainage and sub-base preparation anyway. At least this way if we decide in 10 years time to place rubber we can do this without any additional work being required.

Dinner Dance and Presentation Night:

We held our premier night on Saturday 20th February and once again it was a great success, it was pleasing to see many new faces and new recipients of prizes. Over 120 people attended and they were entertained by the Peter Miller band and once again Master Chef Roland presented us with a great meal and terrific cheese platter.

Finance Report by Allan Trimble



Members should by now have received their copy of the annual accounts and reports for the year ended 31st December 2009, together with the papers for the Annual General Meeting. 2009 was a very successful year financially for the Club, as you will see from the Reports. Our income continued to increase, particularly in the major Membership and Green Fee revenue items and our expenditure has been contained within the expected levels. Our cash position remains strong, and our capital expenditure program for the year was completed on time and on budget. These are all results which were the result of long hours of dedicated input from an enthusiastic staff and those involved in them within the Committee. I do hope that Members take the time to read the various Reports in the Booklet.

The 2010 year has started well and we are ready to present the 2010 Budget to Members at the Annual General Meeting next month. The operations of the Club continue each day and I am happy to report that we have started the year with another month where our income slightly exceeded our expectations, and our costs remained within expected levels. Happily, we have not been required to access the increase level of borrowings approved by Members for the Clubhouse Improvement Program, but instead we finished the year with cash in the bank. We have plans for more equipment and further improvements on the course and for work around the Clubhouse mainly involving the exterior. Our operational expenditure is expected to increase this year compared to last year, so our finances remain an item requiring constant attention. Our plan for 2010 is that our bank account will remain in credit for the whole of the year.

There are many factors which can impact upon our revenue base, and it is always possible for some unforeseen event to create additional expenditure. We therefore need to ensure that each of the activities of the Club are regularly addressed to ensure that they remain financially sound and in keeping with our aim of a high standard of fiscal management. I take very seriously the need for us to ensure that each of the items in the income base and each of the expenditure areas are properly managed. As illustrations of our endeavours we have, in recent times, called for competitive tenders for our cleaning operations, we have made detailed investigations into the cost of supplies for our bar and kitchen operations and we have had in-depth discussions with our security providers. We have addressed the loss in the Kitchen and have plans for improving it's operations. Substantial savings have been made in the cost of supplies for the course, and Members should be pleased to know that the expenditure control is given high priority within the staff and the Committee. Cost control is an area where there will be an even greater emphasis this financial year.

Should you have any query on the Club's financial affairs or on the end of year accounts, please contact me and I shall be happy to provide any available details.

Rules By Paul Barlow

Happy New Year to all and may Gisborne GC continue to prosper and grow. With the course in such great condition, good rains, enthusiastic & hard working staff and a confident & positive membership, there is really no excuse is there for not playing good golf ... is there!!!!

Since the last newsletter, a new decisions on the rules of golf book has been released by the R & A. With over 1200 decisions detailed and explained it makes fascinating bedtime reading. The book is available through the VGA (\$35) and our club has copies available to peruse. Cynicism aside, these "decisions" books are really quite interesting and manage to explain almost all of the rulings that have been presented to the R & A (and the USGA) over many years. I have picked out just a few of the "new" decisions that are included this year.

We will also have a reasonably short "true" or "false" questionnaire, with the answers and how this problem may affect you in actual play.

Change to "Slope" rating and handicapping system

The introduction of the new Handicapping system has been postponed to April 12th (From Feb 1st). From that date, the best 10 of your last 20 rounds will be used to calculate your current handicap as outlined in the last newsletter. The ACR not the CCR will be the benchmark for handicapping purposes. Something I have "picked up" since December is that initially the handicap updates will be done nightly as is now, however it is proposed that these changes be made at 2 or 3 weekly intervals eventually, which seems a strange and retrograde step to me.

Course ratings continue to be undertaken. Albeit slowly and the target for completion of Victorian courses is still Dec 30th, 2012. As an indication of the size of the task, I relate discussions had recently with raters from the N.T. To "do" a course requires a very bare minimum of 3 qualified raters per course. In the N.T. there are 40 courses (approx). There are 3 raters in the N.T. One lives in Darwin, one in Alice Springs and one in Tennant Creek . Mammoth task in logistics for them!

A few of the NEW decisions

Rule 14-2a

Elements include sunlight, rain, wind, snow and other weather conditions, and whilst making a stroke you may not ACCEPT protection from these. EG: by caddy blocking out sunlight on teeing ground.

Rule 20 2a/8

Refers to testing where the ball will roll to when dropped (by using another ball). This is contrary to the spirit of the game and would incur a 2 stroke penalty under the new ruling.

Rule 14 3/10.3

During a stipulated round, a player uses a rod to check his alignment or swing plane.

Ruling? The rod is an unusual piece of equipment and as such he is disqualified for using it. He may carry it but NOT use it.

Rule 30 3f.13

A and B are partners in a Fourball. A's ball is on the green 10 metres from the hole and B's ball is on a similar line on the green 7 metres from the hole. To assist him with his own putt, B stands on an extension of the line of putt behind A's ball whilst he putts.

Ruling? A was in breach of Rule 14-2b for allowing his partner B to position himself on a line of A's putt (or extension of) while he made his stroke. As A's breach also assisted B, B also incurred the same penalty. Rule 30-3f and 31-8. In match play, AB lose the side. In stroke play, A incurs a penalty of 2 strokes and B incurs the same.

Rules (Continued)

3. A pile of grass clippings is always Ground Under Repair. True or False?

6. A player may brush aside frost from his line of putt. True or False?
7. An artificial surfaced path cannot be an "integral part" of the course. True or False?
8. A stake defining the margin of a hazard is in the hazard. True or False?

10. A player may lift his ball anywhere on the course if he feels that it may assist any other player on the course. True or False?
11. If a player considers of a putt too generous, he may decline it. True or False?
12. A player may practice his chipping near the first teeing ground before starting a round of golf. True or False?
13. Objects defining "Out of Bounds" are "Obstructions". True or False?
14. A player's ball lies on the putting green. If he putts and his ball in motion is deflected into the hole by a worm, the ball is "holed". True or False?

Rules (Continued)

Quiz Answers

1. **False.** There is no relief from a tree root that originates IN GUR and travels outside GUR. There is relief if your ball is caught in branches immediately above GUR.
2. **False.** See definition of "stroke". The stroke begins after the downswing begins with the intention of striking the ball.
3. **False.** Only if piled FOR REMOVAL. i.e. there must be full intention & knowledge that the pile WILL be removed by ground staff or Committee.
4. **False.** Ball must be at rest in the bottom of the hole. Do not pick the ball out until this happens.
5. **True.** When it is used to mark the position of the ball, it is not part of the equipment.
6. **False.** Dew and frost are not loose impediments and cannot be wiped or brushed away.
7. **False.** Artificial paths CAN be classified by the Committee as part of the course. In the absence of such classification (local rule), the artificial path IS an obstruction.
8. **True.** You do not get relief from a hazard stake when you are in the hazard. You do get relief if outside the hazard (obstruction).
9. **False.** You may not clean the ball (or even put it your pocket) when marking your ball OFF the green.
10. **True.** Not only may lift but SHOULD lift and note that your ball or a ball may be assisting or hindering any OTHER PLAYER ON THE COURSE. You are there as marker to protect the REST of the FIELD from any indiscretion.
11. **False.** You cannot knock back a concession even if given in jest (& who would!)
12. **True.** You cannot practice on the course prior to stroke play, but the exception is given for around the first tee prior to hitting off.
13. **False.** OOB stakes are not obstructions and no relief is available. However, a stile over the fence and its supports are obstructions.
14. **True.** Lucky you. The worm is a loose impediment, so be kind to it!

"Member of the Month" - Helen Flentje

I have always looked forward to having a conversation with Members for this segment as I know that I am going to hear a very interesting story from real life.

Helen Flentje is a classic example of this fact, she has a lifetime of teaching and travel and sporting efforts. She has met people with inspirational courage and had the pleasure being able to help these people. and then being able to use all these life experiences to teach others. With these experiences she has been able to shape the lives and the future of young people by teaching them of not only how to play the game but also how to love the game, how to treat it with respect and especially how to respect the other people in the game.

Helen was born in Melbourne and grew up in Brighton, her family had come from the Mallee area of Victoria and Helen grew up with a love of outdoor life and an early passion for horses and most things country, any horse standing near a Brighton fence in those days was always in danger of finding a young girl firmly on its back.

There were three girls in the family with Helen the oldest. Her first school was Gardenvale Central and sport was a big part of life. Softball became her first serious team sport and Helen excelled and played the game successfully for more than twenty years, at sixteen years Helen was the youngest member of the Senior Victorian Softball Team.

Through the same years Helen was playing the team sport she loved above others, she played State League Hockey for twenty six years, with her younger sister beside her on the field for six years. The pairing was a most enjoyable time. The absolute concentration on sharing, on contribution to the team, and commitment to such a team oriented sport is obviously her favorite sporting attraction. She maintained her form and interest and played State League until she was forty two .

There are other family members of whom Helen is obviously proud to mention, cousins Stewart Gull of the South Melbourne Swans, Robyn Maher who Captained the Australian Opals in three Olympic Games, and Julie Gross who also played basketball for the Australian National Team.

Back to the younger years, Helen went to MacRobertson Girls High School and then on to Melbourne University where she studied Physical Education, a career path which she says has given her a wonderful life, the outdoor atmosphere and teaching of young children is so obviously a great love.

Helen's first school was Swan Hill High School, as Phys. Ed. Teacher she stayed for three years and then went on to Brighton High School for another three years. After this period of teaching Helen worked for the Education Department for four years in the Curriculum and Research Branch. She worked on producing curriculum guides, making various training films, organizing conferences and advising teachers of Physical Education.

After this decade of teaching and training Helen took a year's leave and left Australia, not the usual route to Europe but by island hopping across the Pacific Ocean by small boats and freighters, destined for South America, California, then finally on to Europe.

Once there she began a real down to earth tour of that vast continent by local bus, cattle truck, train and on foot and visited as many as possible of the internal countries meeting with local people. She moved on to the West Indies and then to the USA where she worked in Coming back to Melbourne, Helen realized how much she missed teaching and young people and went back to Phys. Ed. teaching at Melton High School where she taught for some ten years. It was about this time, when she lived for a while in Bullengarook, that Helen began her association with the Gisborne area and joined the Gisborne Golf Club in 1987. Helen found after ten years at Melton that she needed a challenge and applied to work for Australian Volunteers Abroad, in Botswana, Africa. There she trained teachers and taught Phys. Ed. to local children. This was a place where it was sometimes necessary to make the sporting equipment before the game could begin. Helen regards this as a wonderful part of her teaching career. After three years in Africa she returned and completed a Masters Degree in Education, She resumed her teaching work and then, with her husband David, who was one of the pilots who were forced to look overseas for work in the 1990s, there was a six month period while he worked in Sweden and then two years in Jamaica where Helen taught swimming to disabled people. She was so respected for her work and interest that at the Paralympics Games in Sydney in 2000 Helen was asked to become the Attaché to the Jamaican Paralympic Team and also became the swimming coach when the official Jamaican coach failed to arrive.

Helen is still teaching. At the MRFE Centre in Gisborne she teaches English to new migrants and with the Australian Sports Commission she takes the Active After School programs in various local primary schools. Oh I forgot, she also does some private tutoring. And now we know her for her continued interest in introducing young people to our Golf Club. I could list her Committee activities while at our Club but I would ask, please just look at the Clubhouse boards, Vice-Captain, Captain, Secretary and personally, a great success was winning the B Grade Championship in 2008. However, I know her main interest right now is the assimilation and introduction of junior girls and boys to the game of Golf, a labor of love in her words.

Helen wants helpers for her work with the young people, not to teach the game but to foster the right attitudes and etiquette of our great game, to perhaps play with them in their first competitions to achieve a handicap, but mainly to help them get a start in the great game of life, Golf.

If you will help please catch up with Helen, I know you will enjoy assisting with the young people but more so, just a short conversation with Helen will be the start of a good day.

Junior News by Helen Flentje

We have entered an exciting new phase with regard to Junior Golf at Gisborne Golf Club this year. With the support of the General Committee and the establishment of a Junior Promotions Committee (Ken Baddeley, Graeme Maddern and Helen Flentje), there has been an influx of juniors to the Club. This can only be good for the future.

The Wednesday after school clinics have sixteen very keen boys and girls participating. There are 10 on the waiting list for those clinics, but lack of people to help meant that we cannot take them at present. One of the juniors who started last year has already been handicapped. We were able to get a Grant from the Australian Sports Commission to help purchase extra equipment. Many thanks to Bernie Morrison and Ron Albany who organized a storage space for the equipment and David Flentje who put in shelving etc.

As a result of the Junior Tournament held in December, we have attracted Daniel Wright to join the Club. Daniel plays off 5 and was formerly at Romsey. Daniel and Patrick Morrison (15) will attend an advanced coaching camp in the Term holidays. Patrick had to get his handicap down to 15 to be eligible.

We are commencing Saturday morning clinics on the 27th February. These will run for 8 weeks. We were able to get a Grant from the Victorian Golf Foundation to enable us to enlist the help of James Wright for 4 of the 8 weeks and cover costs. Graeme Maddern who has been running junior clinics with the VGA all over the State is the organiser.

Lastly, I would sincerely like to thank the ladies who help me week by week and Neil Dowling and Lindsay Glover who have stepped up to help me out full time with the Wednesday juniors. When a junior is handicapped, we need mentors to take them around and get them going in competition on Sundays. Not all juniors that come along have golfing parents. 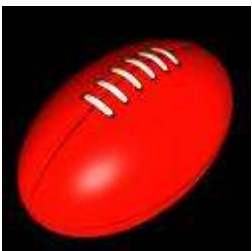
